About Children of the Valley

Founded in 2006, Children of the Valley works in partnership with the Mount Vernon, Sedro-Woolley, and Burlington school districts to serve students K-5/6 referred by a school teacher, counselor, or administrator for exhibiting substantial personal or academic need.* We currently operate five sites with a total of 15 classrooms.

Free to the families and students we serve, our program provides daily instructor-led academic assistance, enrichment activities, and socialemotional learning opportunities, in addition to assisting families with meeting basic needs.

Our Strategic Plan 2023 – 2028

With Children of the Valley sites and classrooms successfully underway in Mount Vernon, Sedro-Woolley, and Burlington, the Board of Directors has established a five-year strategic plan to support and expand program operations. It is clear from waiting lists and community input that the need for COV is high and growing among all grades.

Meanwhile, federal dollars designated for COVID learning loss are due to end at the conclusion of the 2023-2024 school year. A significant amount of the COV expansion has been supported from our school district partners dedicating these funds to COV. With these needs and challenges in mind, the Board of Directors has identified three priorities to serve COV's strategic plan.

Priority One Fiscal Sustainability

Our growth was prompted by the pandemic, and because of funds from COVID relief being reduced and expiring a year earlier than expected, we are focused on achieving fiscal sustainability.

Activities

- Expand our partnerships throughout the greater community.
- Continue our relationships with our sustaining partners.
- Continue to build brand awareness and our donor database throughout Skagit County.

Priority Two Middle School Support

Expand vertically by developing a middle school component to COV for the purpose of student retention and academic success.

Activities

- Create support services for COV students moving onto middle school.
- Engage COV graduates to continue their connection to COV by volunteering.

Priority Three **Program Fidelity**

Ensure that COV's mission and program integrity are maintained at each site and in each classroom.

Activities

- Create systems to gather data and monitor student progression on Cornerstones of Care.
- Provide infrastructure support in order to maintain program quality.









Our Cornerstones of Care

Academic Assistance

Through regular correspondence with teachers, we tailor efforts specific to each child's academic needs, helping them develop better study skills, increase knowledge of core classroom curriculum, and boost self-confidence.

Every day after school, COV children receive academic assistance.

- One hour of daily reading support
- Regular communication with school teacher
- Math-based games and activities
- Assistance with homework completion

Enrichment Activities

COV strives to provide its children with a holistic, whole-circle approach to education which means opening the door to enrichment opportunities that may not be offered to them otherwise.

Social-Emotional Learning

A child's social-emotional well-being is one of the largest factors in their ability to learn. Our goal is to provide COV children with the necessary tools to understand and manage their unique, and often confusing, emotions.



A random sample of COV children shows that, on average, test scores in math improved by 17% and test scores in reading improved by 30% between the fall and spring.

Teacher Feedback

"At the beginning of the year, they did not register on STAR reading assessment. They now are reading at K level which is excellent growth. Math has increased dramatically as well."

Q: What was your life like when you joined COV?

I was raised by a single mother who only spoke Spanish and she was not able to help me with my homework when I was falling behind on turning in homework I was struggling with. My teacher then referred us to COV.

Q: What were the immediate impacts of COV on your life?

I was able to meet other students who shared the same culture as me. I actually met one of my best friends in this program who I still have close contact with. My grades were better each year with the help and support from the teachers and volunteers. I remember running to wash my hands after getting off the bus to get a snack. We would always race to see who would get to the cafeteria the fastest. We were always super hungry after school.

Q: What were the lasting impacts of COV on your life?

My hopes of becoming a teacher came from attending a program just like this where some of the tutors were of color and empowered me to become an educator as well and come and teach my own community. I would like to thank Flora and everyone who made it possible for me to have opportunities like this and for future generations of students as well.

Family Impact

The Suarez Family

The Suarez family has been part of COV for two years. We recently asked them about their experience with COV.

Q: How has COV helped you and your family?

As a single mother living in WA without family to count on, COV has given me just that, peace of mind and a family that I can count on while I am at work. A safe place for my daughter to go after school where she can be herself and feel welcomed. I have always wanted to just give a huge hug to whoever makes this happen and tell them how it truly blesses my family. To be honest, I can't find words on how much the COV program and the staff meant to me. I hope to be able to give back one day. Thank you COV for making some of my hard times easier for me and for allowing me to breathe some relief in the middle of a storm.

Q: What is the difference you have seen in your children since attending COV?

I have seen her learn more about herself and how to deal with different personalities and situations. How to resolve conflict in a positive way.

Gary has been volunteering with COV since November, 2021. He has a total of 72 hours at COV!


Q: What do you love most about volunteering?
